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President's Message

I look forward to being President of the CPS for 2015-16. This is indeed an honor and a privilege. The CPS is an excellent society, run completely by dedicated volunteers who give their time and efforts to promoting Plant Pathology in Canada and

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making the CPS the success it is today. I grew up in Winnipeg and attended the University of Manitoba where I studied science, until I landed a summer job in Agriculture and was hooked. I went on to do my M.Sc. (1989-1991) at the Department of Plant Science with Dr. Claude Bernier as my advisor, and the late Dr. Lakhdar Lamari on my committee and very involved in mentoring my career. I was also fortunate to count the late Dr. Roger Rimmer as an important mentor at the University of Manitoba. We were involved with the CPS early on, as Dr. Bernier was the editor of the CPS Newsletter at the time. In those days the newsletters were printed, stapled, stuffed in envelopes and mailed to all the members (good jobs for grad students). We also had the opportunity to attend CPS regional and national meetings, and meet fellow graduate

students, but also researchers, industry representatives, extension specialists from all across Canada and beyond. I remember one CPS meeting in Banff where I stayed in a tent, I think to save money, but it rained most of the time so it was a pretty soggy adventure. I was impressed that the CPS could bring together these people from all across Canada, who had common interests, and were really fun people.

I went on to do my Ph.D. on cereal rust pathology at the University of Minnesota (1991-1995), with Dr. Alan Roelfs and Dr. Jim Groth, which was another great experience. My fellow graduate students were from many countries around the globe and it gave me a good understanding of the global importance of plant pathology. I returned to Canada in 1995, did a post-doc at the University of Manitoba 1995-1996, then started as a Visiting Fellow in a Canadian Government Laboratory with Dr. Andy Tekauz in 1996 on Fusarium Head Blight in barley. I joined the staff of the Cereal Research Centre, AAFC in 1998, as a cereal rust pathologist and have enjoyed the job ever since.

I look forward to working with our CPS board and members during 2015-16. We are coming off of a successful CPS/Plant Canada/Botany 2015 meeting in Edmonton. This was a large meeting that took a lot of coordination with a number of other scientific societies. Thanks to our past-president Deena Errampalli and the local organizing chair Stephen Strelkov and his team, for all their efforts in making that meeting run so well. We also have a newly launched website that has taken considerable time and efforts by our website editor Melanie Kalischuk and assistant editor Michael Holtz, along with the website committee. The level of commitment of our CPS volunteers is impressive. Bruce Gossen recently volunteered to move many extra boxes of *Diseases of Field Crops of Canada* books to help ease the storage burden on our distributor. David Joly has assembled a team of ready volunteers to organize the 2016 CPS meeting in Moncton, and grad student Gurcharn Brar

along with Mary Ruth McDonald have proposed some exciting ideas for workshops. Jim Menzies and Fouad Daayf are starting to plan for the 2017 CPS meeting in Winnipeg. Our membership secretary Vikram Bisht, is always working hard to get people to renew their memberships and sign up new members. These are just a few of the activities and initiatives made possible only because we have active and dynamic members who are willing to volunteer their time and efforts to make this a better society. There are many others organizing regional meetings, serving on various committees, preparing and implementing strategic plans, putting out newsletters, and making our publications like the *Canadian Journal of Plant Pathology* the excellent products they are.

One dedicated and long term volunteer I would like to highlight in this message is Robin Morrall. Robin has been a Section Editor for the Canadian Plant Disease Survey (CPDS), since 2004, and the National Coordinator, since 2005. This is a big task to which Robin has selflessly devoted his time and efforts over many years. He plans to step down from these positions on May 1, 2016. A search is underway for new volunteers to fill these roles, and our President Elect Odile Carisse is coordinating the search for a new National Coordinator. If you have a chance to say 'thanks' to Robin for his efforts over these many years, please do so. In addition to his efforts on the CPDS Robin served on the CPS board and was president in 1993-94, was one of the editors for the very successful CPS book *Diseases of Field Crops in Canada*, and was named a Fellow of the CPS in 2000. Robin and all the contributors and editors have developed the CPDS into an excellent resource, wonderful historical record, and efforts are underway, through Odile Carisse to index CPDS to make it more accessible for search engines. I am very fortunate to count Robin Morrall as one of

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my mentors, we worked on a disease in lentil together with Dr. Claude Bernier, when I was an undergraduate at the University of Manitoba. Robin loves agriculture and plant pathology. When I had the opportunity to visit farm fields with Robin, he would point out about a dozen things in each field related to the previous crop, fertility, weeds, inoculum sources, canopy development, disease epidemiology, and other aspects of the crop and environment (and I just thought it was a lentil field, well I learned a few things).

I look forward to working with many of you over the coming year. Please let us know when you are planning regional CPS meetings. I will try to attend these meetings, either in person, or by video conference. I also urge each of you strongly to think of deserving colleagues to nominate them for the many CPS Awards. It is great to recognize the excellence of our members, promising graduate students, and colleagues. You can find descriptions for the awards on the CPS website. Message du président

Je me réjouis à l'avance d'être président de la Société canadienne de phytopathologie (SCP) pour 2015-2016. C'est en effet pour moi un honneur et un privilège. La SCP est une société de premier plan entièrement gérée par des bénévoles engagés qui donnent temps et énergie pour promouvoir la phytopathologie au Canada; ces derniers sont également responsables de la réussite qu'elle connaît aujourd'hui. J'ai grandi à Winnipeg et j'ai fréquenté l'Université du Manitoba où j'ai étudié en sciences, jusqu'à ce que j'occupe un emploi d'été en agriculture : à partir de ce moment, j'ai succombé à la fascination. J'ai donc fait ma maîtrise (1989-1991) au Département de sciences végétales sous la direction de Claude Bernier et avec, faisant partie de mon comité, feu Lakhdar Lamari qui a joué un rôle clé dans le déroulement de ma carrière. J'ai également été chanceux d'y avoir eu comme conseiller exceptionnel feu Roger Rimmer. M. Bernier était à l'époque éditeur du bulletin de la Société, nous avons été impliqués dans la SCP dès le début. Dans

ce temps, les bulletins étaient imprimés, brochés, mis dans des enveloppes et postés à tous les membres (de bonnes tâches pour des étudiants diplômés!). Nous avons également eu l'occasion d'assister aux réunions régionales et annuelles de la SCP et de rencontrer des collègues diplômés, mais aussi des chercheurs, des représentants de l'industrie et des spécialistes de la vulgarisation, et ce, de partout au Canada et même de l'étranger. Je me souviens d'une réunion qui s'était tenue à Banff et au cours de laquelle j'avais couché dans une tente. Je crois avoir économisé un peu d'argent, mais il a plu presque tout le temps et l'équipée a été pour le moins « bien arrosée ». Le fait que la SCP pouvait réunir tous ces gens de partout au Canada, qui partageaient des intérêts communs, et qui en plus étaient vraiment amusants, m'a impressionné.

J'ai fait mon doctorat sur la rouille des céréales à l'Université du Minnesota (1991-1995), sous MM. Alan Roelfs et Jim Groth, ce qui s'est révélé une autre expérience fantastique. Mes collègues diplômés provenaient de partout sur la planète et cela a aiguisé ma perception quant à l'importance de la phytopathologie dans le monde. Je suis revenu au Canada en 1995 et de 1995 à 1996, j'ai fait un postdoctorat à l'Université du Manitoba, puis j'ai commencé à travailler avec Andy Tekauz sur la brûlure de l'épi de l'orge après avoir reçu une bourse de recherche scientifique dans les laboratoires du gouvernement canadien. En 1998, je me suis joint à l'équipe du Centre de recherches sur les céréales d'Agriculture et Agroalimentaire Canada à titre de phytopathologiste spécialisé dans la rouille des céréales et je m'y suis plu depuis tout ce temps.

J'ai hâte de travailler, durant ce mandat, avec le conseil d'administration et les membres de la SCP. Nous venons de tenir une réunion conjointe SCP/Plant Canada/Botany 2015 des plus réussies à Edmonton. Cette importante réunion a nécessité une coordination efficace avec un nombre d'autres sociétés scientifiques. Merci à notre présidente sortante, Deena Errampalli, ainsi qu'à l'équipe du comité organisateur local présidé par Stephen Strelkov pour tous les efforts consacrés au déroulement fluide de l'événement. Nous avons aussi lancé notre nouveau site Web qui a nécessité, de la part de notre éditrice, Melanie Kalischuck, et de notre éditeur adjoint, Michael Holtz, ainsi que du comité du site, énormément de temps et d'efforts. Le degré d'implication de nos bénévoles est

impressionnant. Dernièrement, Bruce Gossen s'est offert pour déménager bénévolement plusieurs boîtes supplémentaires de *Maladies des grandes cultures au Canada* afin d'alléger le fardeau d'entreposage de notre distributeur.

David Joly a mis sur pied une équipe de bénévoles prêts à organiser la réunion de 2016 de la SCP à Moncton, et Gurcharn Brar, étudiant diplômé, de concert avec Mary Ruth McDonald, a proposé quelques idées passionnantes pour les ateliers. Jim

Menzies et Fouad Daayf ont commencé à planifier la réunion de 2017 qui se tiendra à Winnipeg. Vikram Bisht, notre secrétaire aux adhésions, travaille toujours d'arrache-pied pour inciter les membres à renouveler leur adhésion et à enrôler de nouveaux membres. Ce sont quelques exemples d'activités et d'initiatives rendues possibles grâce au dynamisme et à l'engagement des membres qui sont prêts à donner de leur temps et à fournir les efforts nécessaires à l'amélioration de notre société. Il y en a encore beaucoup d'autres qui organisent les réunions régionales, qui siègent à divers comités, qui préparent et mettent en œuvre les plans stratégiques, qui publient notre bulletin et qui font de nos publications, comme la *Revue canadienne de phytopathologie*, les produits renommés qu'ils sont devenus.

Je voudrais, dans le cadre de ce message, signaler le travail d'un bénévole dévoué et de longue date : Robin Morrall. Depuis 2004, Robin est rédacteur de section pour l'Enquête phytosanitaire nationale (EPN) et, depuis 2005, il en est le coordonnateur national. Au fil des années, Robin s'est dévoué sans compter à cette lourde tâche. Il démissionnera de ces deux fonctions le 1^{er} mai 2016. Nous cherchons actuellement de nouveaux bénévoles pour pourvoir à ces postes et notre présidente désignée, Odile Carisse, coordonne la recherche en vue de trouver un nouveau coordonnateur national. Si vous avez l'occasion de remercier Robin pour les efforts qu'il a déployés durant toutes ces années, s'il vous plaît, faites-le. En plus de son travail relatif à l'EPN, Robin

a siégé au conseil d'administration de la SCP et en a été président en 1993-1994. En outre, il a été un des éditeurs du très populaire livre de la SCP *Maladies des grandes cultures au Canada*, et a été nommé, en 2000, membre associé de la Société. Robin ainsi que tous les contributeurs et rédacteurs ont fait de l'EPN une excellente source d'information doublée d'un fonds historique des plus complets et des efforts sont en cours, de la part d'Odile Carisse,

pour le rendre plus accessible aux moteurs de recherche. Je suis très chanceux de compter Robin Morrall parmi les gens qui m'ont conseillé. Quand j'étais étudiant de premier cycle à l'Université du Manitoba, nous avons travaillé sur une maladie des lentilles avec Claude Bernier. Robin adore l'agriculture et tout ce qui se rapporte à la phytopathologie. Quand j'ai eu l'occasion de visiter les champs de producteurs avec Robin, il me faisait remarquer une douzaine de choses relatives à la culture précédente, à la fertilité, aux mauvaises herbes, aux sources d'inoculum, au développement du couvert végétal, à l'épidémiologie ainsi que plusieurs autres aspects des cultures et de l'environnement (et moi qui pensais que ce n'était qu'un champ de lentilles — eh bien, j'ai appris quelques trucs!).

J'ai hâte de travailler avec plusieurs de vous dans le courant de l'année. S'il vous plaît, faites-nous savoir quand vous tiendrez vos réunions régionales. J'essaierai d'y assister, soit en personne ou par vidéoconférence. Je vous demande également de penser sérieusement à vos collègues qui mériteraient d'être nommés pour un des nombreux prix décernés par la SCP. C'est bien de reconnaître l'excellence de nos membres, des étudiants diplômés prometteurs et de nos collègues. Vous pouvez trouver la description des prix sur le site Web de la Société. 7. President's Report (Errampalli)

In 2014-15 the CPS Board was very involved in many activities. The most important of all was that CPS has successfully transitioned to the new Canada Not-for-Profit Corporations Act on September 18, 2014. CPS remains in a very good financial position.

CPS membership has gone up from 302 to 374 since last the AGM in 2014. In 2014-15, a new membership category was introduced for technicians, who can join by paying 50% of the regular member fee. Also, student members pay 50% of the regular member registration at the annual scientific meeting. A multi-year membership renewal option has been introduced.

The New CPS website went live on 15 January 2015 and was redesigned to give a new look and the Board hopes that you find the new format and content helpful. Science Policy Committee reports that a Code of Practice relating to inoculum and field research has been posted on the CPS website for review.

On recommendation from the Information products committee, CPS printed 1500 copies of the book *Diseases of Field Crops in Canada (DFCC)* and these copies are estimated to last for three years. *Diseases and Pests of Vegetable Crops in Canada (DPVCC)* is sold out and a high quality scan of the book has been posted on the CPS web in 2015. A series of small volumes on diseases of vegetable crops in Canada are being developed by some our CPS members.

Through the International Cooperation Committee, CPS invited 9 plant pathologists from 6 different countries to be members in 2014-15. The invited members are promoting CPS in their own countries.

Our society journal, *CJPP* is doing well. The Board appointed Stephen Strelkov as the Associate-Editor-in Chief in 2014. The *CJPP* citation index reached 1.1, which is a very good position to be in. Ashlynn Merrifield, representative of Taylor & Francis, the publisher of the *CJPP* gave a brief update on the performance of the journal and outlined upcoming initiatives by the publisher. CPS has enjoyed a very positive relationship with Taylor & Francis during the past 6 years and we hope to negotiate a new contract for 2017.

I stated my hopes of developing collaboration among Canadian and international plant protection societies and similar disciplines in my CPS Vice-president election proposal in 2012. I am pleased that the CPS has forged new collaborations during 2014-15. About 10 significant collaborations are published in the *CPS News* June 2015 issue.

This year, the CPS is meeting with 12 other plant societies from Canada and the United States in Edmonton under Botany 2015 from July 25-29, 2015. With an estimated 1650 delegates, this will be the largest gathering that the CPS has ever participated and co-located in. CPS was very involved in organizing of the two CPS-co sponsored symposia with national and international speakers at the joint meeting. A special thank you goes to Tom Hsiang for organizing Next Generation Sequencing symposium while Errampalli organized the Induced Resistance symposium. CPS also raised funds for these two symposia. A new initiative for the CPS at this meeting is the inclusion of student members as the co-moderators at the contributed papers sessions and I hope this will continue in the future. I thank the 2015 CPS Local Arrangements Committee at Botany 2015, Steve Strelkov (chair), Sheau-Fang Hwang, Mike Harding, and Ileana Strelkov, for raising funds for CPS activities including the CPS banquet and awards ceremony that was held at Fort Edmonton on July 28. A special thank you goes to Ileana, who made arrangements for a fabulous banquet.

The Awards Committee worked very hard and selected the awards winners for this year. A report from the 2015 Awards Committee is published in the June *CPS News*.

Strategic Planning Committee is working very hard to provide you with a 4th Strategic plan this coming year. Most of these items were included in the President's message(s) in September and December 2014 and March and June 2015 issues of *CPS News*. Thank you to all committee chairs and members, the Board and the membership for your contributions, without which we could not have accomplished so much in one year. In closing, I enjoyed working with you and thank you for your confidence in allowing

me to lead you, promote you nationally and internationally and to journey with you this past year.

9. Report of the Financial Advisory Committee (Elmhirst)

CPS Budget forecast is appended to the minutes as Appendix 2

Our society is in excellent financial shape. Our society has operated at a net profit of \$35-40,000 a year since 2009, mainly due to income from the Canadian Journal of Plant Pathology and book sales. If current trends continue, our 5-Year Budget projects a \$0.5 million surplus in the General (non-restricted) Fund by 2019.

This means that we are able to undertake new projects and initiatives that will benefit our membership and advance the profession of plant pathology. The Financial Advisory Committee has made several suggestions to the board for their consideration, one of which, to raise the amount of the Student Travel Award from \$500 to \$1000, the board has approved already. The board has pledged support for a public relations strategy, also, which will be developed in consultation with our Public Relations Committee.

The new Strategic Planning Committee (2016-2021) will be sending a survey to the membership in the coming year and I encourage members to submit your ideas.

I would like to thank our Treasurer, Ken Conn, for re-designing the 5-Year Budget document so it is easier to read. I would like to remind everyone that the 5-Year Budget numbers are simply projections and the "best guesses" of Treasurer Ken Conn and the Financial Advisory Committee, based on current information and are subject to change.

We will be nominating a new member of the Financial Advisory Committee at next year's AGM, so I urge anyone who thinks this would be of interest to them, to consider volunteering for this position.

Scientific Program: over 1600 delegates have registered to attend the Botany 2015, Science and Plants for People meeting from July 25-29, 2015 in Edmonton, Alberta. The scientific program had a total of 1396 abstracts! There were 13 special addresses, 689 papers, 480 posters, 22 symposia with 191 symposia speakers, 3 colloquia, 6 discussion sessions and 17 workshops.

Appendix 3 - The 3rd Strategic Plan Implementation Report for 2014-15

This report represents the summary of the 3rd CPS Strategic Plan (2011-2016) by goal for 2014-15. The Strategic Plans have provided the Society with an excellent directional guide since 2000, and have helped in focusing activity. The vast majority of the goals initially set out have been addressed to some extent. Many of the goals will, however, be ongoing and will probably reappear in the next Strategic Plan. It is important that the accomplishments of the last four years are maintained and built upon in the coming years.

Vision:

We are a diverse, proactive and dynamic professional scientific organization committed to creating and sharing knowledge of plant pathology in Canada and beyond.

Mission:

The CPS/SCP encourages and supports research and education in plant pathology, heightens public awareness of the importance of plant diseases and the benefits of controlling them, and serves as a forum for discussion of policies and strategies affecting all aspects of plant pathology in Canada.

GOAL 1: MEMBER SERVICES - to foster professional development for Society members.

1.1. CPS/SCP Website.

General. Redesign and revamp CPS/SCP website (High Priority) - *Completed*

The website was completely redesigned in 2014 by Modern Earth, a web designing company. The CPS Website Committee has populated the site with pertinent information from the old web site and launched the new website on January 15, 2015. Refinements and improvements have been ongoing, with improved format and content. The Board has appointed **Melanie Kalischuk** as the Web Editor and **Michael Holtz** as the Assistant Web Editor for a three year term beginning 2015. Updating the web site with suggestions from the Board of Directors is on-going.

1.1.1. Job Placement opportunities - Ongoing

Currently members are placing the calls/opportunities in CPS News via e-mail and by posting on the new CPS/SCP website, beginning 2015.

1.1.2. Mentorship through CPS. The objective was to find Mentors - Ongoing

The Board has discussed this issue in 2014-15. Unfortunately little progress was made. Some questions related to mentoring will be included in the mini-survey that will be distributed electronically to the membership in 2015-16.

1.1.3. Foster Industry/Public Collaboration - *Partially Completed*

URL or web Links of Agri-industries were posted on the new CPS Website in 2015. The committee has been dormant for some time. Terms of Reference for the CPS Public Relations Committee have been established in 2014-15. This committee is to bring report to the 4th Strategic Planning committee in 2015.

1.1.4. New disease/pathogen awareness item on the CPS website

This will be followed up in 2015-16.

1.1.5. Research News Highlights of CIPP

This will be followed up in 2015-16

1.1.6. Establish Members-Only section - *Completed in 2014*

Refinements and improvements have to be made

1.2. Professional Development at Annual Meetings

1.2.1. Evaluate effectiveness of annual meetings

The Board of Directors discussed of possibility of sending a survey by e-mail within one or two weeks after each annual meeting of members in 2014-15. Development of questionnaire with include questions on what people would like to see in the future in the way of professional development/workshops at annual meetings will be carried out in 2015-16.

1.2.2. Support workshops and training

Please see 1.2.1. regarding inclusion of questions on workshops/training of interest in survey. Support and encourage LACs of CPS Annual Meetings to consider workshops, with LAC to contact Board of Directors for discussion of workshop finances. Errampalli (President) communicated this to the 2015 LAC, and CPS sponsored (financial and organization) two symposia at Botany 2015: one with the Mycological Society of America (MSA) and Plant Canada and the second with the Canadian Society of Plant Biologists (CSBP) and Plant Canada.

1.3. Promotion of Regional Meetings and services

1.3.1. Fund and promote regional events

Guided by this 3rd Strategic Plan, the CPS has committed to building on the success of regional meetings. Errampalli (President) attended CPS regional group meetings in person and offered greetings/presentation and updates from CPS during 2014-15 and encouraged the organizers of the upcoming meetings to organize workshops and training for regional members and, if required, to contact the Treasurer with detailed requests for support for such activities. CPS-Maritime and CPS-SK regional groups had made use of the funds from CPS in 2014-2015. A new feature in 2014, Calendar of events, which include the dates of the Regional meetings was introduced in CPS News in 2014-15. Also, the dates were published on the website.

1.3.2. Joint regional meetings with other groups

Ensure that local arrangements committees are aware of this goal. Errampalli mentioned this during her presentation to different regional groups in 2014-15. The only regional groups that have joint meetings are PPSA (AB) and CPS-SK, approx. once every three years. PPSA or CPS-BC meets immediately before or after the Western Forum, when possible. In 2014, PPSA met just before the Western Forum in Canmore, Alberta, October 27-29, 2014. Conversations have begun to hold Ontario Pest Management (OPMC), SORA-CPS and Ent. Soc. of Ontario in 2016 in November or in the future. This needs to be discussed with the Regional reps

Goal 2: COMMUNICATIONS - to provide a forum for the collection, discussion and dissemination of information pertaining to all aspects of plant pathology and to activities of the CPS/SPC.

2.1. Strengthen support for regional, national and international meetings

2.1.1 Assist regional meetings organization

In the fall of 2014, Deena started a new Calendar of Events section in the September 2014 issue of *CPS News*, in which regional meeting dates have been included. The Calendar of Events is to be forwarded to Webmaster to post on the website in 2015-16.

2.1.2 President or designate attends meetings - *Ongoing*

President attended regional meetings in 2014-15.

2.1.3. Review mandate of International Cooperation Committee

TOR for the International Cooperation Committee completed 2014. In 2013-2014, 5 free one-year memberships were awarded and in 2015, 9 memberships from 6 countries in Asia, Europe and North America were awarded. Committee is active.

2.1.4. Increase international role

In 2014-15, Errampalli promoted CPS on the international stage: 1. Deena Errampalli, CPS President, was invited as a Guest of honour at the 11th European Foundation for Plant Pathology (EFPP) international conference in September 2014 in Krakow, Poland; 2. She presented a plenary talk and fulfilled many dignitary functions at the conference; 3. CPS brochures were displayed at the Congress; 4. one member of EFPP has joined CPS in 2014 and EFPP presented a one-year honorary membership to Errampalli.

2.1.5 Regularly hold joint meetings with other professional societies

In 2014, CPS met jointly with APS in Minneapolis, MN, USA. In 2015, CPS held meetings with 12 other plant societies - Botany 2015 with a theme "Science and Plants for People", in Edmonton, AB. In 2015, CPS co-sponsored two symposia: one with the Mycological Society of America and Plant Canada, and the second with the Canadian Society for Plant Biologists and Plant Canada. Both symposia featured national and international speakers.

2.1.6 Encourage graduate students and post-docs to attend regional and annual meetings

CPS approved to present 3 annual student scholarships of \$1500 each in 2011-12. Since then, these scholarships were awarded and presented at the AMOM each year. Beginning 2015, graduate students were offered 50% off of the regular registration fees at the AMOM. This was announced by Deena Errampalli at the regional meetings (PPSA, CPS-BC, CPS-SK, CPS-SORA, CPS-MB) and also in the December 2014 issue of *CPS News*.

2.2 Continue to improve quality and impact of *CJPP*

The impact factor for *CJPP* was maintained around 1.0 in 2014, and has gone up to 1.1 in 2015, which is a good accomplishment for *CJPP*. Thanks to Editor-in-Chief, Zamir Punja and committee for good work.

2.2.1 Increase mini-reviews and special topics

Deena has solicited a review article from Jennifer Thomson, Glenn Anderson Lectureship Award Winner at the 2014 APS-CPS joint meeting, and it will be published in 2015. Also, Deena has requested CPS co-sponsored symposia speakers at Botany 2015 to prepare review articles for a special edition of *CJPP* to be published in 2016-2017, and six speakers have agreed.

2.3 Enhance and diversify content of CPDS

2.3.1 Encourage survey and report submission

CPDS is now on-line on CPS website.

2.3.2 Solicit more articles from under-represented areas for CPDS

Deferred to 2015-16 Board.

2.3.3 Complete electronic database

Gayle is to look into finding a third party to work on developing CPDS database and indexing in 2015.

2.4 Expand content and use of website

2.4.1. Add new features to website

CPS Website with new features went live on January 15, 2015. Updating the website will be dynamic and will continue.

2.4.2 Review responsibilities and roles of website editor

Effective January 2015, the web Editor will be Melanie Kalischuk, and Michael Holtz Associate Editor. They will work with the Junior and Senior Directors-at-Large. Roles and responsibilities for the website committee are in the new By-Laws.

2.4.3 Membership survey

Membership survey, which is a part of planning for the 4th strategic plan was conducted in the spring of 2015. Data is being analyzed.

2.4.4 Review resources for website

CPS now has Facebook and twitter. Host domain renewal is due in August 2015 and will be renewed.

2.4.5 Create a database of plant pathology resources in Canada

We have some links but do not have a database. Future Boards need to work on this. Also, add this to 2015 membership survey to determine if there is any interest.

2.4.6 Provide timely information about meetings, etc.

The Board has investigated development of a CPS meeting registration webpage that could be linked to PayPal. Ken Conn, CPS Treasurer, indicated that this will save a lot of money for the Society as compared to contracting it out to a third party. Brent McCallum, President-Elect, suggested a web page that was used for a Fusarium workshop and has initiated correspondence with the Web Editor in June, 2015.

2.5 Support production of specialized publications

2.5.1 Revise DPVCC.

Diseases and Pests of Vegetable Crops in Canada (DPVCC) is sold out and out of print. A high quality scan has been posted on the CPS website in 2015. Smaller volumes on specific crops/pests combinations are being developed.

2.6.1 Make brochures, stationary, posters, etc.

All the promotional materials are being used by the Board and members, as required.

2.6.2 Improve newsletter (e.g. broaden the circulation beyond CPS members, include paid advertising, improve readability of the electronic version, adopt some of the features of the APS newsletter)

The Board has decided not to use advertising in the newsletter. In 2014-15, Deena as the President sent out issues of *CPS News* to the presidents of Canadian and International plant pathology/protection societies (EFPP, Polish Phytopathological Society, British Plant Pathology Society, American Phytopathological Society, Phytopathological Society of Mexico, etc.), as time permitted.

Goal 3: ORGANIZATIONAL EFFECTIVENESS - To ensure the long-term operational and financial viability of the society.

3.1 Critically assess current strategic plan

3.1.1 Assess action steps

The review of the 4th year of the 3rd plan was completed in December, 2014. The 2014-2015 Board has appointed a 4th CPS Strategic Planning Committee and Mary Leggett (past CPS president and current CPS member) as the Chair of the committee. Mary has formed the 13-member committee that represents various CPS regions: Federal and Provincial governments, students, regular members, past and current Board members. Deena sent the updated 3rd strategic plan with Board comments to the new Strategic Planning Committee in March 2015.

3.1.3 Critique the steps in developing the strategic plan

This evaluation of 3rd Strategic Plan, which will be completed in June 2016, will be carried out by 2016-17 Board.

3.1.4 Review the strategic plans of other societies

In Jan/Feb 2015, Deena requested that Mary Leggett and her committee review the APS Strategic Plan and glean items that can be adopted to CPS in the 4th Strategic Plan.

3.2 Sustain and enhance member services

In 2014-15, Deena compiled the membership of the first three strategic planning committees and contacted some of the potential members. She identified Mary Leggett as the Chair in August 2014 and is thankful that Mary agreed. Mary then formed the committee and they had their first committee meeting in December 2014.

3.2.1 Survey the general membership

In preparation for the 4th Strategic Plan, a survey of membership was conducted in the spring of 2015.

3.2.2 Maintain high level of services - Ongoing

Ongoing and hopefully more efficient with the new website launch. Members-only area and Board member area will be created. These will be password protected.

3.2.3 Enhanced activity and content of website

New website went live in January 2015. See goal 2.

3.2.4 Review services in other societies

Randy Clear reviewed in 2017. Online payment of CPS Membership dues is now available.

Goal 4: MEMBERSHIP - to increase the number and diversity of members in the society.

4.1 Recruit more graduate students and technicians

Beginning 2015, CPS is offering 50% off of membership fee to technicians. This new category was added to the 2015 membership form. Also, 50% off of registration fee is offered to the students, beginning 2015. We hope that this will increase student and technician participation.

4.1.1 Special deals for members (e.g. with registration)

4.1.2 Encourage students to attend regional meetings

Deferred to 2015-16 Board

4.1.3 Membership packages for students and technicians

Beginning 2015, CPS is offering 50% off of membership fee to the technicians. This new category was added to the 2015 membership form. Also, Beginning 2015, student members will pay 50% of the regular member registration fees.

4.1.4 Involve more students and technicians - *Ongoing*

President sent a message to the Regional reps and LAC to involve students and technicians in the Society related activities.

4.2 Encourage scientists, post-docs and grad students from other societies to join CPS

4.2.1 Dual membership deals with other societies

The APS has discount membership/groupmembership for developing countries.

4.2.2 Organize special sessions with interest to other groups (e.g. molecular biology)

In 2015, CPS and the Mycological Society of America (MSA), and also CPS and the Canadian Society of Plant Biologists will fund and co-sponsor two joint symposia at Botany 2015. Since August 2014, Deena has worked with the APS International Relations Committee to establish a symposium that is mutually beneficial to APS and CPS memberships.

4.2.3. Encourage foreign plant pathologists to join CPS

CPS President (Deena Errampalli) was invited as the "Guest of Honour" at the EFPP conference in September 2014 in Krakow, Poland. There, she presented a talk to delegates and also to the presidents and representatives of the Plant Pathology societies in Europe, and encouraged them to join the Society. One member joined CPS.

4.2.4 Get members from outside Canada

Initiative began in 2014. Also, the Board recommends that this item to be included in the 4th Strategic Plan (2016-2021).

4.3 Keep emeritus members involved in society

4.3.1 Encourage members to mentor graduate students and post-docs (e.g. create a list of mentors and their expertise on the CPS website; the mentors could be government, industry, emeritus scientists and scientists from universities)

In January 2015, based on the recommendations from the Board, the 4th Strategic Planning Committee has included one emeritus member on the committee. CPS acknowledges that the demographics are changing and there is need to keep emeritus members engaged and benefit from their knowledge and experience in plant pathology in Canada. Some suggestions include reduced registration fees (50% off of regular member fees) for emeritus or 1-day registration fee reduced by 50%, or banquet ticket alone. This needs further discussion. In 2014-15, CPS President contacted some emeritus members for feedback.

4.3.2 Collect and preserve historical information

In 2014, Deena contacted Denis Gaudet and Archives Canada. CPS has archived materials only until early 1990s. Once we receive a letter from the Charities Directorate, Deena and Gayle will send the new articles and By-laws (that were approved on Sept 18, 2014 under the new Canada NPF act), etc.,

to be archived. Also will compile CPS business meeting minutes, etc. and send then to Denis to be archived with Archives Canada. Also to include this item in the 4th Strategic Plan (2016-2021).

4.3.3 Involve members in public awareness - *Ongoing*

Need more input. Also to include this item in the 4th Strategic Plan (2016-2021).

4.4 Reduce number of lapsed memberships - *Ongoing*

4.4.1 Ask regional reps and emeritus members to make personal contacts

There was a drop in membership in 2014 to 302 members, but membership has increased to 347 by June 2015. Need to look at ways to improve the record. Also to include this item in the 4th Strategic Plan (2016-2021).

4.4.2 Identify reasons why members do not renew membership

The membership secretary (Vikram Bisht) along with the President and Past-President have contacted lapsed members and encouraged them to renew or find out why they have not renewed.

Goal 5: ADVOCACY - to promote public awareness of plant pathology in Canada

There were no annual reports from this CPS Education Committee for the past two years.

Suggestions are being solicited from CPS members and others interested in this, and the comments will be received by the CPS President (by e-mail link on the website) and the document will be updated by the Science Policy Committee with the suggestion, as required.

7. Rapport de la présidente (Errampalli)

En 2014-2015, le conseil d'administration de la SCP a été intensément impliqué dans de nombreuses activités. La plus importante a été que la SCP a réussi, le 18 septembre 2014, son passage à la nouvelle Loi canadienne sur les organisations à but non lucratif. La situation financière de la SCP demeure saine.

Depuis la réunion annuelle de 2014, l'effectif des membres est passé de 302 à 374. En 2014-2015, nous avons créé une nouvelle catégorie de membres pour les techniciens qui peuvent dorénavant se joindre à la SCP pour 50 % de l'adhésion d'un membre en règle. Aussi, les membres étudiants paient 50 % des droits d'inscription d'un membre en règle à la réunion scientifique annuelle. Nous avons également mis en place une option de renouvellement de l'adhésion sur une base pluriannuelle.

Le nouveau site Web de la SCP a été mis en ligne le 15 janvier 2015. Sa refonte avait pour but de rafraîchir son aspect et le conseil espère que son nouveau format et ses nouveaux contenus vous seront utiles. Le Comité de la politique scientifique rapporte qu'un code de pratiques, relatif aux inoculum et à la recherche en champ, a été affiché sur le site de la SCP pour révision.

À la suite d'une recommandation du Comité pour les produits d'information, la SCP a imprimé 1 500 exemplaires de *Maladies des grandes cultures au Canada*. Ces exemplaires devraient durer trois ans. *Maladies et ravageurs des cultures légumières au Canada* est en rupture de stock et une version numérisée de haute qualité du livre a été affichée sur le site de la SCP en 2015. Des membres de la SCP élaborent actuellement une série de petits livres traitant des maladies des cultures légumières.

Par l'entremise du Comité de la coopération internationale, la SCP a invité, en 2014-2015, neuf phytopathologistes provenant de six pays différents à devenir membres. Ces derniers promeuvent la SCP dans leurs pays d'origine.

La revue de notre société, la *Revue canadienne de phytopathologie* (RCP), se porte bien. Le conseil a nommé Stephen Strelkov rédacteur en chef adjoint en 2014. L'index de citation de la RCP a atteint 1,1, ce qui est excellent. Ashlynn Merrifield, représentante chez Taylor & Francis, l'éditeur de la RCP, nous a présenté une mise à jour des performances de la *Revue* et nous a exposé les grandes lignes des futures initiatives de l'éditeur. Au cours des six dernières années, la SCP a joui d'une relation des plus positives avec Taylor & Francis et nous espérons négocier un nouveau contrat pour 2017.

En 2012, dans le cadre de mon engagement électoral à titre de vice-présidente, je vous ai fait part de mes espoirs de développer des collaborations entre les sociétés de protection des plantes et de disciplines connexes canadiennes et internationales. Je suis heureuse que la SCP ait établi de nouvelles collaborations en 2014-2015. Une dizaine de collaborations importantes sont publiées dans le numéro de juin 2015 du *CPS/SCP News*.

Cette année, du 25 au 29 juillet, la SCP se réunit avec 12 autres sociétés canadiennes et américaines de protection des plantes à Edmonton sous l'égide de Botany 2015. Avec environ 1 650 délégués qui doivent y participer, il s'agira de la plus grande réunion à laquelle la SCP aura participé. La SCP s'est

impliquée au plus haut point dans l'organisation des deux symposiums qu'elle a cocommandité avec les conférenciers nationaux et internationaux. Je tiens à remercier Tom Hsiang tout spécialement pour avoir organisé le symposium sur le séquençage de nouvelle génération, tandis qu'Errampalli a organisé le symposium sur la résistance induite. La SCP a également recueilli les fonds pour ces deux symposiums. Une nouvelle initiative de la part de la SCP à cette réunion a été l'inclusion d'étudiants membres à titre de comodérateurs lors de la séance de présentation de documents, et j'espère que cette pratique se poursuivra. Je remercie le comité national organisateur (CNO) de Botany 2015, composé de Steve Strelkov (président), Sheau-Fang Hwang, Mike Harding et Ileana Strelkov, pour avoir recueilli les fonds nécessaires aux activités de la SCP, y compris le banquet de la SCP et la cérémonie de remise des prix qui se sont déroulés au Fort Edmonton le 28 juillet. Je tiens à remercier tout spécialement Ileana qui s'est occupé d'organiser un fabuleux banquet.

Le Comité des prix a travaillé très fort et a choisi les lauréats des prix pour cette année. Son rapport pour 2015 est publié dans le numéro de juin du *CPS/SCP News*.

9. Rapport du Comité consultatif des finances (Elmhirst)

Les prévisions budgétaires de la CPS sont indexées au compte rendu, à l'annexe 2.

La santé financière de notre société est excellente. Depuis 2009, la SCP affiche un profit net annuel de 35 000 \$ à 40 000 \$, et ce, principalement grâce aux revenus générés par la *Revue canadienne de phytopathologie* et les ventes de livres. Si la tendance se maintient, les prévisions sur cinq ans,

c'est-à-dire d'ici à 2019, tablent sur un surplus de 0,5 million de dollars dans le fonds général (fonds non affectés).

Cela signifie que nous pouvons entreprendre de nouveaux projets et lancer de nouvelles initiatives qui profiteront à nos membres et feront progresser notre profession. Le Comité consultatif des finances a fait quelques suggestions au conseil pour qu'il les étudie, dont une concernant l'augmentation de la bourse de voyage pour étudiant de 500 \$ à 1 000 \$, ce qu'il a déjà accepté. Le conseil s'est également engagé à soutenir une stratégie de relations publiques qui, aussi, sera développée de concert avec le Comité des relations publiques.

OUTSTANDING YOUNG SCIENTIST (GORDON GREEN AWARD)

Dr. Curt McCartney, Research Scientist at Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada Cereal Research Centre, Morden, MB

Dr. McCartney has made significant contributions to plant pathology in Canada through his outstanding research, mentorship, teaching, and contributions to the CPS. He graduated with a PhD in agriculture in 2002 from the University of Manitoba after which he worked as a Visiting Fellow at the Cereal Research Centre in Winnipeg. In 2006 he was hired as an Assistant Professor in the Department of Plant Sciences at the University of Saskatchewan and in 2010 Dr. McCartney was hired by Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada as a Research Scientist at the Cereal Research Centre in Winnipeg. In his current role, Dr. McCartney has been conducting excellent research in the general area of genetic analysis of

wheat and oat. Dr. McCartney currently has over 20 research publications in highly reputable journals and one book chapter. He has been a leader in a number of different research areas and has a range of knowledge and skills usually found in someone with many more years of research experience. He is an excellent role model for the graduate students he mentored and the under-graduate students he taught. In the CPS, He has been a senior and junior director, Website Committee member, and Section Editor (Genetics and Resistance) for the Canadian Journal of Plant Pathology. He is currently the chair of the Website Committee and leading a project to review and renovate the CPS website. The Canadian Phytopathological Society is pleased to extend the **Gordon Green Award to Dr. Curt McCartney as OUTSTANDING YOUNG SCIENTIST** in recognition of his exceptional achievements.

OUTSTANDING RESEARCH

Dr. Odile Carisse, Research Scientist at Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada, St Jean sur Richelieu, QC

Dr. Carisse is an internationally recognized scientist with a strong track record of ground breaking research on a range of pathogens and crops, focusing primarily on epidemiology and disease management of fruit and vegetable crops. She is the author/co-author of 80 papers in scientific journals, one book, 12 book chapters and review articles (mostly invited), 27 descriptions of apple and strawberry cultivars, and hundreds of factsheets, abstracts, and technology transfer publications. Dr. Carisse is a world leader in quantitative molecular aerobiology. One example of her many accomplishments is a DNA-based method for quantifying air-borne inoculum of *Botrytis squamosa*, a damaging pathogen of onion. This technique allowed for accurate quantification of air-borne inoculum in real time for use in disease management by producers. She is a senior editor for *Phytopathology* (2012–present) and in 2008 she was elected Chair of the Epidemiology committee of the International Society of Plant Pathology. In 2013, she was elected as foreign correspondent of the Académie d'Agriculture de France (French Academy

of Agriculture). She has been invited as scientific expert for the FAO to review research programs at the International Rice Research Institute, and in 2005 was the international expert invited by the French Minister of Agriculture and Ecology to chair the symposium 'Pesticide, Agriculture and Environment' in Paris, France. The resulting book served as a framework for the French policy on pesticide reduction. She has also served as an external scientific expert in many countries and many international organizations. She is the 2010 recipient of the award for 'Achievement in Grape Disease Management' from the French Phytopathological Society. She has supervised or co-supervised 20 MSc and PhD students, been a member of advisory committees for seven students, and external examiner for three PhD students in Canada, two from France. In the CPS, she has been a Director and an associate editor for the *Canadian Journal of Plant Pathology*. The Canadian Phytopathological Society/La Société canadienne de phytopathologie is pleased to award the **OUTSTANDING RESEARCH AWARD** to **Dr. Odile Carisse** in recognition of her exceptional accomplishments.

ACHIEVEMENTS IN PLANT DISEASE MANAGEMENT

Dr. Allen Xue, Research Scientist at Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada – Eastern Cereal and Oilseed Research Centre, Ottawa, ON

Dr. Xue received his PhD from University of Guelph. After post-docs at University of Guelph and AAFC-Lacombe, he was appointed as a pulse crop pathologist at AAFC Morden Research Centre in 1994. He was known as a leader in pulse crop pathology in Western Canada until 2000, when he transferred to ECORC to lead the research program on cereal and soybean pathology. He is the senior author of four patents and has published over 100 peer-reviewed papers and book chapters and over 300 conference proceedings, disease survey reports and technology transfer articles. Dr. Xue has supervised four post-doctoral fellows and five visiting scientists, co-advised five PhD students and three MSc students. Dr. Xue has served as committee member and chair of several sub-committees of the CPS.

Dr. Xue initiated and led the original research on the identification, evaluation and development of

commercial formulations of a microbial biofungicide which provides an effective alternative to chemical fungicides for the control of Fusarium head blight (FHB). The biofungicide developed by Dr. Xue is made from the fungus *Clonostachys rosea* strain ACM941 and is patented in Canada and the USA. The development of ACM941 biofungicide is a ground-breaking achievement. When applied to crop residues, ACM941 was more effective than the fungicide at reducing the production of perithecia, fruiting bodies, the initial source of disease inoculum and responsible for generating epidemics in Canada. Dr. Xue worked closely with PMC BioPesticides to facilitate a Joint Regulatory Submission to PMRA and US-EPA, and also assisted in the commercialization of the technology which is now known as DONguard™ from Adjuvants Plus Inc. It will be commercially available in 2016. The Canadian Phytopathological Society is pleased to extend the **ACHIEVEMENTS IN PLANT DISEASE MANAGEMENT award** to Dr. Allen Xue for his outstanding contributions to the management of fusarium head blight.

CPS FELLOW

Dr. Denis Gaudet, Research Scientist, Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada – Lethbridge Research Centre (retired)

Denis Gaudet was born and raised in Victoria, B.C., and studied botany at the University of Victoria. His first exposure to plant pathology was in his 2nd year where he was employed as a summer student in the Plant Pathology Section at the Pacific Forest Research Centre in Victoria. From his first day on the job, Dr. Gaudet was enthralled with the study of plant diseases. Dr. Gaudet pursued his MSc degree at Montana State University on the root and crown rot complex in sainfoin, and his PhD at North Dakota State University on the genetics of virulence and aggressiveness in *Ustilago hordei*, the barley smut fungus. After his graduation in 1982, he accepted a job at the AAFC Research Centre in Lethbridge. Over his career, Dr. Gaudet has made significant and important contributions to the understanding and management of many cereal diseases including snow moulds, smut and bunt diseases and stripe rust to name a few. His efforts have been recognized in the development of over 11 winter and spring wheat varieties, over 80 research publications, and numerous book chapters. He has also co-authored a book on snow moulds. Dr. Gaudet has been active in the International Working Group on Smuts and Bunts and has organized two of their International Meetings. He also provided the Conference Keynote Address at a recent meeting in China. He has established extensive international collaborations in the USA, France, Norway, Sweden, Japan, and China. He has twice served as President of the Plant Pathology Society of Alberta, as well as on the Awards Committee. He served as Chairman of the Organizational Committee for the 1988 CPS meetings in Banff, Alberta, and as the CPS-SCP Representative on the Plant Canada Organizational Committee for the Annual Meetings in Edmonton in 2005. He served on the Board of CPS as Director for two years and as Secretary for four years. He served as Section Editor for CJPP for five years. He has served on the CPS-SCP Historical Committee for the past 25 years, initially setting up the archiving of CPS documents and currently oversees this task. In 2004, he took lead in the writing and publishing Plant Pathology in Canada, 1970-2008, a sequel to I. L. Conners' Plant Pathology in Canada-Pathologie

végétale au Canada. This new book was published in 2010. Dr. Denis Gaudet is also very active as a volunteer in his community has been recognized for his community service by the AAFC Research Branch, The United Way, The City of Lethbridge, the Lethbridge Soccer Association, and the Lethbridge Regional Science Fair. He has also served the Big Brothers and Sisters and Bridges of Hope programs. Dr. Gaudet embodies the qualities, dedication, and passion for plant pathology that is highly valued by the Canadian Phytopathological Society. During his 33-year, professional career he has worked tirelessly and with great enthusiasm in many different capacities that have had a profound impact on the science of phytopathology and success of our Society. The Canadian Phytopathological Society is pleased to recognize **Dr. Gaudet as a FELLOW** for his outstanding service and contributions to the Society and the profession of plant pathology.





REPORT ON BOTANY 2015 ‘Science and Plants for People’

Local Arrangement Committee report

Report of the Botany 2015 Science and Plants for People, a joint Meeting of Canada and USA Plant Scientific Societies, held from July 25-29, 2015 in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada

This year, the Canadian Phytopathological Society (CPS) met jointly with Plant Canada. Plant Canada is an umbrella organization for six Canadian plant societies including, Canadian Botanical Association (CBA), Canadian Phytopathological Society (CPS), Canadian Society of Agronomy (CSA), Canadian Society for Horticultural Science (CSHS), Canadian Society of Plant Biologists (CSPB) and Canadian Weed Science Society (CWSS). Plant Canada holds national scientific meetings once every four years, with one of the six member societies hosting the conference. This year, Plant Canada (with CBA as a host for 2015) co-organized its 1st international

meeting entitled “Botany 2015 Science and Plants for People ” with the Botanical Society of America from July 25-29 in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada.

A total of 14 plant scientific societies or organizations from Canada and the USA participated in the meeting: American Fern Society, American Bryological and Lichenological Society, American Society Plant Taxonomists, Botanical Society of America, International Association for Plant Taxonomy, Mycological Society of America, Society for Herbarium Curators, CBA, CPS, CSA, CSHS, CSPB and CWSS.

Over 1620 delegates from five continents attended the Botany 2015, Science and Plants for People meeting from July 25-29, 2015 in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada and explored a wide-range of recent advances in plant sciences. The scientific program had a total of 1396 abstracts! There were 13 special addresses, 689 papers, 480 posters, 22 symposia with 191 symposia speakers, 3 colloquia, 6 discussion sessions and 17 workshops. At this meeting 23 field trips were organized.

The Plenary lecture of the conference titled, "Botany is cool: so why doesn't the public know that?" was presented by Ken Thomson from University of Sheffield, United Kingdom.

A highlight of the symposia at the Botany 2015 meeting was that co-sponsorship of a symposium by at least two different plant societies allowed for interaction and collaboration between different plant scientific societies.

From the meeting of the 14 plant societies, here we report highlights from the CPS and Plant Canada:

CPS and plant pathology activities at Botany 2015:

Poster sessions. All society poster session was held on Monday (July 27) from 5:30 to 7:30 pm. There were 42 posters under Host/plant Pathogen Interactions and Plant Health Management topic. CPS student poster competition was held at the same time and three winners were chosen.

CPS co-sponsored Symposia: On Monday (July 27) afternoon, CPS along with Plant Canada and CSPB has co-sponsored a symposium titled "Basic and applied approaches to improve disease resistance in plants" and was moderated by CPS President Dr. Deena Errampalli and Dr. Robin Cameron, a member of both CPS and CSPB. The co-moderator, Dr. Cameron gave a 15 minute overview at the beginning of the symposium. There were six talks. The first three talks were on the basic approaches to understanding the induced resistance: "Using DIR1 to investigate long distance signal movement during Systemic Acquired Resistance" by Dr. Robin Cameron (McMaster University, Canada); "The NPR1 Salicylic acid receptor: Trailblazing from basic science to commercialization" by Dr. Charles Despres (Brock University, Canada); "Putting it all

together: Modulation of the interplay between plant immunity and fungal virulence by environmental factors" Dr. Amir Sharon (Tel Aviv University, Israel). The next talk by Dr. Brad Day (Michigan State University, USA) provided a bridge between basic and applied research and the title of his presentation was, " Next generation solutions from the detection of plant pathogens: from genes to genomes to nanobiosensors". The last two talks focussed on the applied nature of the induced resistance in field and postharvest: "Use of chitosan and benzothiadiazole to control pre- and post-harvest diseases of grapes and fruit plants" by Dr. Gianfranco Romanazzi (Marche Polytechnique University, Italy) and "Induced resistance as a tool in plant disease management" by Dr. Deena Errampalli (Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada, Canada). This symposium was well attended. All these six symposia papers will be published in a special issue of CJPP in 2016.

On Tuesday (July 28), CPS along with the Mycological Society of America (MSA) and Plant Canada co-sponsored a symposium titled "What can next generation fungal genome sequencing do for you?" and was moderated by CPS member Dr. Tom Hsiang. The moderator, Dr. Tom Hsiang presented a 15 minute overview. Symposium speakers were Dr. Tom Hsiang (University of Guelph, Canada), "Introduction to fungal genome sequencing and assembly"; Dr. Louis Bernier (university of Laval, Canada), "Genome-wide analysis of yeast/mycelium dimorphism in a nonmodel pathogen"; Dr. Jo Anne Crouch (USDA-ARS, USA), "Genomics of *Colletotrichum* fungi impacting the production of food, fuel and fiber"; Dr. Ning Zhang (Rutgers University, USA), "Phylogenomic analysis and comparative genomics of Magnaportheales"; Dr. You Liang Peng (China Agricultural University, China), "Comparative genomics of the rice blast fungus *Magnaporthe oryzae*"; and Dr. Chris Todd Hittinger (University of Madison-Wisconsin, USA), "Saccharomyces evolutionary genomics and beyond".

Contributed paper sessions. On Tuesday afternoon (July 28) and Wednesday (July 29) morning four contributed paper sessions with a total of 28 papers were presented under the topic, the Host/plant Pathogen Interactions and Plant Health Management sessions.

Student co-moderators at the contributed paper sessions. New initiative for the CPS this year is to have a CPS student member to co-moderate with an experienced regular CPS member at each of the contributed paper sessions. This initiative was well received with many positive comments and CPS hopes to continue the inclusion of student members as the co-moderators in the future meetings.

Biocontrol session by CFBC Every second year CPS hosts a session on biological control organized by the Canadian Forum for Biological Control (CFBC). On Wednesday (July 29) afternoon, CPS hosted a contributed oral presentation session on biological control titled “Biological control of diseases and weeds”, co-chaired by Mr. Andrew Wylie (CPS student member) and CFBC Vice- President Dr. Gary Peng (regular CPS member). Seven papers and three posters were presented under this topic.

CPS Business meetings. The 2015 Annual Meeting of Members (AMOM) and lunch was held on Tuesday July 28, 2015 at the Shaw Conference Centre and Fort Edmonton in Edmonton, and over 100 members were in attendance. The minutes from the AMOM are published in this issue of *CPS News*. The CPS LAC at the Botany 2015 meeting wishes to thank all attendees and sponsors for their support, which ensured a successful meeting in Edmonton. The CPS Local Arrangements Committee for Botany 2015 raised funds to support various meeting related activities, including the banquet, which was free to all members of the CPS. Plant Canada business meetings, certificates and awards: The 2015 Plant Canada Annual Meeting of Members (AMOM) was held on Sunday July 26, 2015 at the Shaw Conference Centre in Edmonton. Two new board members were elected during this meeting: Dr. Deena Errampalli, President and Tariq Akhtar, Treasurer and the new Board for 2015-16 were installed. 

