## Message du président

Chers membres la Société canadienne de phytopathologie,

## Committee Reports

### **Canadian Plant Disease Survey**

A record 68 papers were submitted to the Canadian Plant Disease Survey for the 2018 growing season (2019 Edition, Volume 99). The CPS Board of Directors has contracted with Taylor & Francis to publish the survey as an annual supplement to the Canadian Journal of Plant Pathology (CJPP). Co-publication is expected to increase the accessibility of the survey and expand the readership of both the CJPP and the CPDS. The CPDS will retain its own identity and will continue to be free and open-access to all but, will change its reference citation and other formatting to match the CJPP.

Unfortunately, co-publication of Vol. 99 has been delayed due to technical difficulties, both in Canada and the UK, but is expected sometime in June/July. In the meantime, the 2019 edition (Vol. 99) has been posted on the CPS website as of June 5.

The process is expected to go more smoothly in 2020. For the 2020 edition, submission deadlines will remain the same as in the past. Instructions to authors (formatting, etc.) will be sent to CPS members and published in the CPS NEWS in September.

Many thanks to our authors, section editors and technical staff for their efforts and patience as we adapt to our new format.

### **Information Products Marketing Committee**

The CPS Board authorized a small reprinting (2,100 copies) of Diseases of Field Crops in Canada that was completed early in 2017. There are 1265 copies in stock, but inventory continues to drop in response to steady demand. Major updates were prepared in 2018 on three diseases of canola (blackleg, clubroot and verticillium stripe) and one of pea and lentil (root rot), which had been identified as being particularly out-of-date. It appears likely that these updates will go directly into a new revision rather than being printed as a supplement, because work on a new revision is moving forward quickly. Right now, chapter leads are working with their teams to bring the material in each chapter up to date. The new edition will likely be available in 2020. Anyone with great slides of symptoms for use in DFCC or who is interested in contributing to the revision of the text should contact Syama Chatterton or Mike Harding, who are leading the project.

In addition, Ron Howard and colleagues have been making progress on a new volume, Diseases and Pests of Greenhouse Crops, which will be the first volume in a planned series based on revision of sections from Diseases and Pests of Vegetable Crops in Canada.

The committee thanks Richard Gugel for many years of contribution on this committee, and wishes him success in retirement. Also, the committee welcomes new members Genevieve Marchand, Mamadou Fall and Gurcharn Brar, and invites others to volunteer and join in.

### CPS President Elected Fellow of APS



Dr. Dilantha Fernando, President of our society has been elected a Fellow of the American Phytopathological Society for his contributions to excellence in research, graduate training and service. Dilantha is a Professor and Dean of Studies at the University of Manitoba.

The American Phytopathological society grants this honor to a current APS member in recognition of distinguished contributions to plant pathology or to The American Phytopathological Society. Recipients of this honor receive a plaque and recognition granted to only a few society members. APS is the premier scientific organization for plant pathologists from around the world.

Dilantha is recognized by APS as a world authority on the study of host-pathogen interactions in canola-blackleg, wheat-fusarium pathosystems and for his pioneering work on foliar biological control and understanding the mechanisms in biological control of Sclerotinia in canola. In addition, Dilantha is recognized for his many contributions to training HQP and for his service to international agriculture and scientific societies.

Excerpts from the citation: Born in Sri Lanka, Dr. Dilantha Fernando earned a B.Sc. (Hons) in Botany from University of Peradeniya, Sri Lanka, a MSc. in Microbiology from the University of Kelaniya, Sri Lanka and a Ph.D. in Plant Pathology from Oregon State University, USA. After completing postdoctoral positions in the U.S. and Canada, Dr. Fernando joined the Department of Plant Science, University of Manitoba in 1998 and was promoted to full professor in 2006. He is internationally recognized for his research on blackleg of canola, Fusarium head blight of wheat and biological control of foliar pathogens. He has played an integral role in breeding and management of resistance in the multibillion dollar Canadian canola crop. Dr. Fernando has led a broad assortment of major international collaborations and projects. Dr. Fernando has trained a huge amount of HQP. Dr. Fernando's teaching, research and service have been recognized by numerous prestigious awards. For his global contributions to plant pathology, his dedication to student training and service to professional societies, the APS recognize Dr. Fernando as APS Fellow.

Dilantha will receive this award and honor in early August in Cleveland, OH, USA at the APS annual general meeting.



## Young Scientists' Corner

**Carole Balthazar**

Université de Moncton



Carole tending to her plants

I have always been interested in the small living things. Looking through the microscope for the first time during my undergraduate studies in biological engineering, I immediately wanted to explore deeper this astonishing world in the palm of my hand. A master in phytopathology at the Université catholique de Louvain, in Belgium, enabled me to ally this passion for microbiology to my passion for plants and agriculture. In 2009, the ink on my master's degree was not even dry when I decided that that I wanted to see the world, but to make a big move this time. I

grabbed my suitcase and immigrated to Canada the following year, for what was supposed to be "a short experience abroad." Seven years and many jobs later, I had become a proud Canadian citizen and a registered Professional Agrologist in New Brunswick. At that point, I decided to tackle my dream and return to my first love, plant pathology (and its lurking critters), by undertaking a Doctoral degree. Today, I am in the second year of my PhD program under the supervision of Dr. Martin Filion and Dr. David Joly. My work focuses on the dreaded fungus *Botrytis cinerea* attacking hemp fields (*Cannabis sativa*). An ancient crop discredited by legal issues, *Cannabis sativa* is now one of the fastest growing industries in Canada, making it a multibillion-dollar crop excluded from almost all past scientific attention. I am using several soil-borne bacteria (*Pseudomonas* spp. and *Bacillus* spp.) as biological control agents against *Botrytis cinerea* for hemp crops, but my results could easily be applied to marijuana indoor production. I am a proud recipient of a CPS graduate student scholarship and laureate of the NSERC 2018 Science Exposed contest. I intend to become an expert in molecular biology serving the agricultural sector by looking for innovative ways to protect our crops while respecting our environment.
